

## **PREFACE**

Tracking the Lives of Our Ancestors

There's more to the story of us! What you are about to read is an updated narrative about our Trabue and Pope ancestors and their children. It supplements the 2020 updated *Harris/Trabue Family Genealogy & History: Story of Us.* The information herein will fascinate and wow you many times, as our family history is both interesting and surprising. The narrative weaves an intriguing summary of the lives of our ancestral parents, their siblings and children, yet holds faithfully to information gleaned from historical records and documents they left behind. The assumptions I make about our ancestors will be obvious. I use words like: appeared, likely; assumed; presumed;

possibly, plausible, etc. But, know that assumptions are based on practical interpretations of the documents available to me.

I have included most of those documents after the narrative. Please review them as they confirm the narrative and give additional details. Archival newspaper clippings of obituaries and miscellaneous articles are included to give insight into who our ancestors were, how they lived, and the value they were to their communities. Some materials are hard to read, but they are also a reference for the information and conclusions presented in this narrative. Reviewing all these records for yourself will help bring your ancestors closer and make them real.

Surnames in *italics* (or parentheses) for females indicate their marital surnames. Expect the spelling of names and years of birth on records to be inconsistent by a letter or by a year or two because the record takers and our ancestors' information was recorded to the best of their recollection, education, estimation or how they heard it spoken to them. Also, the penmanship of record clerks is sometimes hard to decipher by modern transcribers. Uncertain or unknown details are indicated with a question mark (?). Multiple generations of great-grandparents are indicated with an exponent number such as 2 (great<sup>2</sup> for great-great) and 3 (great<sup>3</sup> for great-great-great)

I've included after this narrative a list of known burial locations for our ancestors and relatives that have been identified. Though not complete, the list shows how thick our roots are in Indianapolis.

With all the people in these two lineages, it's sometimes difficult to keep separate who's who, as duplicate and unfamiliar names make it even more confusing. To help, I've charted our direct ancestors in the Family Pedigree Chart included after this narrative. In addition, to help you keep track of your ancestors and their descendants as you read through the narrative, I've created a coding system of numbers and letters based on a family member's place in their family group in the two outlines called, Trabue Family Group and Pope Family Group. In the narrative, these codes will usually appear after an ancestor's name (Ex: Hazel Trabue (24/25-J-4)) the first time it appears. You can then reference that individual within their family group.

Let me briefly explain the coding system. An ancestor's Root Number reflects his/her position in their particular Family Group. Their children are coded using the

Parental Root Code of the parental pair. The first child of a parental pair is assigned with the letter A added to the Parental Root Code; the second child, with the letter B, and so on for subsequent children according to birth order. The code for each grandchild is extended with numbers 1, 2, 3 and so on according to birth order. Here's an Example:

I hope it gives you a grounded sense of pride about your genetic roots and your worth in the present. Remember, the hopes and dreams our ancestors had for themselves and for their children and grandchildren have come to fruition in you—in us.

## INTRODUCTION

After publishing *Harris/Trabue Family Genealogy & History: The Story of Us* in 2015, my research of our ancestors continued on. New information compiled here updates and uncovers more records and documents which tell a broader story about the people from whom we descend.

My present study of our Trabue and Pope Lineages extends from the paternal side of our beloved, late mother and grandmother, (3) Hortense Phyllis Trabue Harris. My 2015 study had yielded information about the Indianapolis, Indiana family of her father (6) LeRoy Trabue who moved to Chicago about 1913 to practice pharmacy. As voluminous as the previously uncovered records were, I had only scratched the surface of our Indiana and Kentucky roots. For instance, my present study revealed the full name and details of our great<sup>2</sup>-grandfather previously known only as (24) C. Trabue and his eleven siblings! It added to our Family Pedigree our previously unknown Pope

great<sup>3</sup>-grandparents, (26) Wilkinson Pope's parents and his grandmother (our great<sup>4</sup>-grandmother!).

This renewed research verified more ancestral descendants in Indianapolis, Marion County, Indiana, which uncovered more Kentucky roots in Louisville, Jefferson County, also in the town of Cane Valley in Adair County and in the town of Columbia, its county seat.

It wouldn't be an exaggeration to surmise that we share common ancestors with a majority of the surnamed Trabues and Popes living today in Indianapolis and Louisville.

#### The Trabue Surname

The following detailed explanation for the origins of the Trabue surname was written in an early 1800s book, *Colonial Men and Times: The Journal of Col. Daniel Trabue* (et. al) edited in 1915 by Lillie DuPuy VanCulin Harper. Here is the excerpt:

# Family Name of Trabue, Originally Strabo or Straboo

A person of the name of Strabo, a Greek Geographer, was born 63 B.C. He went to Rome, 29 B.C. and died in the reign of Tiberius after 21 A.D. He traveled and wrote some seventeen books, geographies and histories.

In 809 A.D., in Swabia (Germany), occurs the name Walkfried Strabo. He was an Ecclesiastic and Author. Went to Aix-la-Chapelle, in Germany, and was tutor of Charles, son of Louis V, the Pious. He was then appointed Abbe of Reichenau. He was a poet, and died while crossing the Loire, August 18, 849 A.D.

This data is quoted to show that the Family name of "Strabo" existed in Rome, Italy, in its worthy exponent, the Geographer, as early as 63 B.C.; and again in the Poet and Tutor Strabo, in Aix-la-Chapelle, Germany in the ninth century.

"My grandfather's name was Sir Anthony Straboo, but Colonel Byrd (of Virginia), set it down Anthony Trabue, and so we write our names to this day."

--Colonel Daniel Trabue's "Journal."

#### Third Generation:

SIEUR ANTOINE STRABO (or Sir Anthony Trabue), born in Montauban, on the Tarn, in old Guyenne, France, in 1667.

He died in Manikin Town, near Richmond, Virginia, America, January 29, 1724, aged 56 years.

## Next, A Little More Background About Our Earliest Seeds

Sir Anthony Trabue sailed from Europe in 1700 to escape religious persecution in France and disembarked in Richmond, Virginia. His grandson, Daniel Trabue, born 1760 in Chesterfield, Virginia, joined the Revolutionary Army. Having fought battles with Native Americans in Kentucky in 1778, Trabue returned to Kentucky in 1785 with his wife. Amongst his group of settlers was brought from Virginia 12 to 15 black men. He settled in the area apportioned from Green County formed in 1792 that would become Adair County. Carved from Virginia, Kentucky was also granted statehood that year.

Adair County was established in 1801 and was named for South Carolina's General John Adair (1757-1840) who led troops in the Revolutionary War. He became a Kentucky State Representative, a U.S. Senator, a Governor in 1820 and lastly a U.S. House of Representative.

The town of Columbia is the County seat, chosen in 1802. The town was planned and laid out by Revolutionary War veteran Colonel Daniel Trabue (1760-1840). Governor Garard at the time appointed him County Sheriff and justice of the peace. Trabue was not a planter. Trabue was a proprietor of a tavern and a retail store establishment during his life. In 1810, Daniel Trabue had enslaved 8 persons. Robert Trabue, a relative, had enslaved 4 persons. Could the people they enslaved be our ancestors, our earliest seeds? The censuses don't give enough information about these slaves. But, it's possible since our known ancestors presented in this study were born and worked in Adair County since about 1820.

Kentucky, being a border state with the free states of Illinois, Indiana, and Ohio, was a major hub for trading and trafficking slaves to sell to Missouri slaveholders and elsewhere in the deep South. This geographic position made Louisville in Jefferson County a profitable place for revenue earned by County Sheriffs who captured runaway slaves to return to their slaveholders. Advertisements were prolific in Louisville for the purchase and sale of slaves, as well as for the bounty hunting of fugitive slaves. Louisville's economy benefited from the slave demands of the agricultural South and the manufacturing demands of the industrial North. Wholesale traders, whose livelihoods depended on the cotton produce of the South, favored the Confederates.

At the beginning of the Civil War, blue-collar workers, retailers and business professionals such as lawyers, supported the Union. Kentucky tried to maintain its neutrality, but finally declared its allegiance to the Union in the fall of 1861. Louisville became the staging ground for Union troops from Indiana, Illinois, Ohio and other free states, before they marched to the South.

There were military battles in Kentucky. Adair County was the site of minor skirmishes such as the 1861 Battle of Gradyville and John Hunt Morgan's Christmas Raid of 1862-63. However, there were no battles in Louisville, Jefferson County.

Free black men had attempted enlistment into the Union Army since 1861. However, Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation in January of 1863 was the clarion call to enslaved African Americans across the Confederate States to join the Union cause to end slavery and restore the unity of the states. Because Kentucky had elected to remain in the Union, the Proclamation wasn't applicable to slavery there. Everywhere, black men, slave and free, and some with families, flooded the Union "contraband camps" for protection from slaveholders. The U.S. Government housed and fed them and mustered black men into a regiment, if they wanted to be soldiers.

Union enlistment automatically freed fugitive slaves. In Kentucky, enslaved women were encouraged to marry soldiers, if they so inclined, as marriage extended the soldiers' freedom to them and their children. This enlistment policy infuriated slaveholders and made those who supported the Union resentful. The military barred slaveholders from the Union camps to protect the slaves who sought refuge there. Still, the slaves were unwelcomed by Union soldiers, their fighting capabilities untrusted, and their bravery doubted.

### The 107th Regiment

The 107th Regiment United States Colored Infantry was organized from Louisville, Kentucky during May 3 - September 15, 1864. A Regiment totaled a thousand men, which contained ten Companies.

According to historical records, 186,097 African American soldiers fought to end slavery in our nation. That was 10 percent of the total of Union soldiers. About 137,000 black soldiers were ex-slaves. In the 1860 Census, the black population in the nation was about 4.4 million or 14 percent; and only 488,000 blacks were counted as free.

#### Our Ancestors in the Civil War

Among the 23,702 black soldiers from Kentucky who contributed to the fight for freedom and the restoration of the Union, three were our ancestors: Curran Trabue, Sr. (24), our great<sup>2</sup>-grandfather born about 1824; his son Peter H. Trabue (24/25-C), our great-uncle born 1848; and George B. Pope (52/53-A), born about 1833. I assume that the Trabues and Pope didn't know each other previously.

The probability is high that our ancestors were considered fugitive slaves as I did not find these men in the 1860 Census or prior censuses for free citizens. Although the Trabue and Pope slaveholders may have been professional men and perhaps sympathetic to the Union, they still lost their valued "human property" when these men escaped and were no doubt infuriated. Still, I will use the phrase "left enslavement".

George left enslavement at the Pope estate in Louisville, Jefferson County at age 38 and was mustered into Company A of the 107th Regiment, with the rank of Corporal, on 18 July 1864. Each Company had 100 men of which only eight were Corporals.

Together, Curran Sr. and son Peter left enslavement at the Trabue residence in Cane Valley, Adair County at ages 40 and 16. Both were mustered as Privates into Company I of the 107th Regiment on 5 September 1864 at Lebanon, Marion County, Kentucky. Our great<sup>2</sup>-grandfather and uncles immediately answered the call to freedom when the 107th Regiment United States Colored Infantry (USCI) formed in their locales.

The 107th Regiment was first ordered to Baltimore, Maryland, then to City Point, Virginia, and engaged in many other skirmishes in Virginia. The 107th was instrumental in the battle successes in North Carolina namely at Fort Fisher, Sugar Loaf Hill, Federal Point, Fort Anderson, Wilmington, and others during the Campaign of the Carolinas. The 107th Regiment, including our ancestors, was amongst the 100,000 Union troops led by General Ulysses S. Grant during the battle at Petersburg, Virginia between June 1864 and April 1865, which led to Confederate General Robert E. Lee's surrender at Appomattox, Virginia, which ended the Civil War.

Not until the ratification of the Thirteenth Amendment on December 18, 1865 was slavery officially abolished in the Union State of Kentucky and elsewhere in our country. The soldiers of the 107th were mustered out of service on November 22, 1866 and the 107th Regiment was decommissioned. See the 1865 photo of the 107th Regiment included.

Black soldiers fought valiantly as many Union officers attested in the day. However, it was amazing that any black soldiers returned from the war. Black soldiers (including our ancestors) received inadequate training, were used as the first-line of defense at the front of the battle theater; their likely hand-me-down uniforms, firearms, ammunitions, and food rations were inferior; and they suffered delayed pay which was less than that paid to white soldiers. However, they were equally ravaged by disease both in Union camps and in prisoner-of-war camps. On both sides of the conflict, more soldiers died from disease than from battle.

In the eyes of whites, the emancipation of slaves had devalued the lives of black people as "previous property with monetary worth" to "worthless liabilities" that competed with them for economic opportunities and resources; and thus blacks were maltreated. After the end of the War, Corporal George Pope and Privates Curran Sr. and Peter Trabue returned home to their families in Kentucky. Black veterans were "persecuted and outraged in many ways" by the social and legal system. For example, when a black veteran returned to retrieve his family, his ex-slaveholder had him jailed for theft without bail, claiming that he stole the clothing his family wore when they left.

Freed African Americans were resented by ex-slaveholders and whites in general, both Union and ex-Confederate. The Lincoln Administration enacted an informal program called Reconstruction after the War to ease previous slave states through transition from slavery. With the support of peacekeeping Union troops, Reconstruction sought to encourage southern white Americans to treat our freed ancestors and their brethren as fully entitled citizens in legal matters and fairly

compensate them for their labor and produce. It sought to help African Americans claim and participate in their hard-fought right to education, voting rights, and to demand fair wages. Reconstruction benefited our three veteran ancestors as they couldn't read or write.

Despite the unwelcomed reception that black soldiers received, the 1870 United States Census documents our ancestors and their families living nearby the white Trabue and Pope Families whose land and homes they worked in before they joined the ranks of the Union military.

One of the consequences of President Lincoln's assassination was that Reconstruction lost its champion and enforcer. Due to southern white resistance and political compromises after the 1876 presidential election of incumbent, Ulysses S. Grant (Lincoln's party), the Republicans gave up on the task to integrate blacks and exslaves into full citizenship and Reconstruction ended in March of 1877.

## TRABUE ANCESTORS & FAMILIES

#### Curran Trabue, Sr. (24)

The 1870 Census found Private Curran Trabue, Sr., our great²-grandfather in Columbia, Adair County, Kentucky (born 1824, described black) at age 45 employed as a farm laborer for a black farmer. Wife Margaret (25) and family weren't identified with him on the 1870 Census. The two children I believe were their oldest (born between 1835 and 1847) were not identified in available census records.

The 1880 Census enumerated Curran Sr. with wife Margaret (25) (both described black) and six children living in Cane Valley, Adair County. He was employed as a farm laborer. For the twelve years during Reconstruction, our ancestors dealt with the negative racial atmosphere in Kentucky; but after the Reconstruction troops left in 1877, living there became intolerable for them.

Between 1880 and 1882, Curran Sr. moved his family to Indianapolis, Indiana. On 14 June 1882 from Indiana, Curran Sr. at age 58 applied for his Army pension benefits, as cited by his pension record. Margaret, at age 67, filed an application from Indiana as his widow to claim his pension benefits on 3 January 1887. Therefore, it is assumed that Curran Trabue, Sr. died in year 1886 at age 62 in Indiana. They were married for at least 38 years. His burial place is unknown.

## Margaret A. Scott *Trabue* (25)

Margaret A. Scott, great<sup>2</sup>-grandmother, was born enslaved in May of 1820 in Virginia, which remained consistent throughout the censuses. She was likely brought to Kentucky by her slaveholder. The year is not known. All her identified children, the oldest known child born in 1848, were born in Kentucky. Therefore, she arrived prior to

that year or perhaps before 1835 after the time her two oldest unidentified children were born.

I assume that Margaret and Curran Sr. were allowed to "marry" prior to parenting their children. At the birth of Peter H. Trabue (24/25-C) in 1848, her oldest known child, she was age 28 and Curran Sr. age 24.

In September 1864, when Curran Sr. and son Peter left Margaret and enslavement to join the 107th Regiment, Curran Sr. left behind a newborn son, Beverley (24/25-H), and four other children, Minervia (24/25-G), Susan (24/25-F), Jackson (24/25-E), who was our great-grandfather, and Lucy (24/25-D) all under age 11 and possibly the two other previously mentioned children in their teens. After Curran Sr. returned home from the War, they remained in Adair County, adopted the Trabue surname, and had four additional children, Lee (24/25-I), Curran Jr. (24/25-J), Edward (24/25-K), and Margaret Jr. (24/25-L) between 1866 and 1874. They were born free.

At the time of the 1880 Census, Margaret and Curran had six of their children home with them in Cane Valley. Curran Sr. and her sons ages 16, 14, and 9 were working as farm laborers. However, by 1882, they had migrated to Indianapolis and Curran Sr. began drawing his Army pension. He passed away in 1886. In 1887, Margaret continued supporting their youngest two children ages 12 and 15 on his widow's pension.

The 1890 Census was destroyed in a fire in Washington, D.C., so no additional information can be learned about the Trabues until the next census.

The 1900 Census finds Margaret *Trabue*, our great²-grandmother at age 80; and for the first time that census documented her birth as May 1820; and that she and her parents were born in Virginia; and that Margaret and Curran Sr., our great²-grandparents, gave birth to twelve Trabue children, all born between 1835 and about 1874.

Also present on this census page was her fourth child, daughter Lucy Trabue *Vaughan* (24/25-D), age 45, and her children William E Vaughan, age 18, and John Vaughan, 16. Living next door was Lucy's in-law family, the Vaughans.

Margaret A. Trabue (25), our great<sup>2</sup>-grandmother and family matriarch at the time, died about 1904-05 in Indianapolis at about age 85.

#### Peter H. Trabue (24/25-C)

Private Peter H. Trabue (our great-uncle, presumed to be Curran Sr. and Margaret's third child) returned to civilian life at year-end 1866. My research next found him with wife Mary Josephine Baker *Trabue*, both age 30, on an Adair County birth record, which is included here, for their first child, John R. Trabue (24/25-C-1), born on 2 February 1878. Peter and Josie left Adair County in 1880 after the birth of their second child, son Theodore Trabue (24/25-C-2) born in November 1879. They likely led the Trabue migration to Indiana. Peter's wife and two children were enumerated in the 1880 Census for Center Township, Marion County, where Indianapolis is located. He was employed as a farm laborer.

On 11 May 1889, at age 41, Peter filed from Kentucky, according to his Army pension application, to claim his benefits. He filed at a relatively young age likely because he had battle injuries that limited his ability to work. Why he filed from Kentucky when living in Indiana is not known.

The next available census, the 1900 Census for Indianapolis, enumerated Peter H. Trabue, his wife Josie, both age 51, with seven children, his father-in-law Peter Baker, and his sister Minervia Trabue *King*. Minervia's death certificate in 1923 revealed that the maiden name of her mother was Margaret Scott, as informed by Minervia's second husband Morton P. Lawrence.

Peter and Josie Baker Trabue gave birth to another son during the 1890s and a daughter in 1900 for a total of nine Trabue children. In 1901, Josie perished tragically in a train accident that was gruesomely detailed in a newspaper article included in this compilation. Josie left behind six of her nine children under 18, her baby daughter as young as ten months old.

Peter's first child, John R. Trabue (24/25-C-1), fathered ten Trabue children with his wife Ida Trabue.

Peter's second child, Theodore B. Trabue (24/25-C-2), was age 20 at the time of the 1900 Census. In 1908, Theodore opened a barber shop on the southeast side of the city.

Six months later, Theodore's father, Peter H. Trabue, passed away in Indianapolis on 30 May 1909 of asthma. His burial place is currently unknown.

By 1910, according to that Census, Theodore, the "head of household," age 30, was still single. He no longer had the barber shop and was a laborer for the railroad. Living with him were three of his siblings: Ercie Trabue *Johnson* (24/25-C-4), age 27, divorced; Carrie Trabue (24/25-C-5), 23 and William Trabue (24/25-C-7), 18, both single; and Cousin John Hancock, 18 and single.

On 19 September 1931, at age 52, Theodore B. Trabue's life came to a tragic end and under suspicion of murder. He was the victim of a rifle shooting by another man. Theodore had no known children. Read the details in the news articles included here. The photo of Theodore bears a striking resemblance to our late Uncle Clarence H. Trabue (d. 11 April 2011).

## Lucy Trabue Vaughan (24/25-D)

The assumed fourth child of our great²-grandparents, Curran Sr. and Margaret Trabue, was Lucy Trabue, born September 1852. The present research found the record of her marriage to Richard Vaughan in 1880 in Adair County and that record is included herein. She and Richard had two sons, William (24/25-D-1) and John (24/25-D-2). William, however, died of tuberculosis in 1904 at age 22. Lucy Trabue Vaughan also contracted tuberculosis and followed her son William in death on 17 September 1907. Their burial places are currently unknown.

## Andrew Jackson Trabue (12)

Andrew Jackson Trabue, our great-grandfather, was born on Christmas Day, 25 December 1855 in Cane Valley, Adair County, Kentucky to parents Curran Sr. and Margaret Trabue. Jackson is assumed to have been their fifth child. Their family was enslaved.

Jackson, as he was called, was age 9 when his father Curran Sr. and teenage brother Peter left enslavement to join 107th Regiment. When they returned, he was 11.

In 1872, the *Courier-Journal*, Louisville's newspaper, wrote a story that said, "first exclusively negro coroner's jury ever impaneled in this State served in an inquest..." The case was about a knife fight between two black men aboard the steamer *Robert Burns*. One man stabbed and killed the other. One of the jurors on the panel was a man named Andrew Trabue. I believe him to be our great-grandfather, another historical highlight.

The current research uncovered the actual marriage record of (12) Andrew Jackson Trabue to Sarah Holt, his first spouse on 28 December 1876 in Adair County. The document revealed that Curran Sr. hosted the marriage at home. Sarah's father, Jeremiah Holt, was also in attendance. Jackson was age 22 and Sarah was age 16.

Since the previous 2015 study, the following came to light. On 11 October 1877, Sarah delivered Jackson's first child, a daughter named Mattie C. Trabue *Duncan* (24/25-E-(12)-1) in Crocus, Adair County, Kentucky. After that documentation in 1877, Sarah Holt *Trabue* disappeared from subsequent census records. I assume she died before the 1880 Census. The present research suggests that Jackson left Kentucky with daughter Mattie and followed his siblings to Indianapolis earlier than 1885 as originally assumed; perhaps he arrived about 1880, with brother Peter and his family.

Jackson married (13) Susan Ann Pope *Howard*, our great-grandmother, in 1887. From her previous marriage, Susan Ann was a widowed mother to three children, ages 13, 8, and 1. He then fathered four sons with Susan Ann for a total of five of his own. Together, they had eight children. His second child, son (6) LeRoy Trabue (24/25-E-(12/13)-1), is our direct ancestor and grandfather. Jackson's sons are chronicled in the updated pages of the previous study.

Both Jackson and Susan Ann worked their farm and raised their children, while also investing in Marion County land and real estate, which he learned to do from his father-in-law Wilkinson Pope. Jackson also worked as a fireman from about 1905 to 1910.

All his life, Jackson was involved with the Pope family church, Olivet Baptist. Susan Ann's funeral was held there after she passed in 1907. They were married

twenty years. As Jackson's three stepchildren were adults, the two oldest with families of their own, he was left with his youngest stepson, Caswell Howard (52/53-13-3), age 21, and his four young sons, (6) LeRoy, our grandfather, age 17; Oliver Horace (24/25-E-12/13-2), 13; Otto Jackson (24/25-E-12/13-3), 11; and Russell Pope (24/25-E-12/13-4), 7; which he continued to raise alone.

The 1920 Census enumerated Jackson as age 61 and widowed. Earlier records would say his actual age was 64. He owned his residence and was likely retired or unable to work. His sons Russell, 19, and Otto Jackson, 23, and daughter-in-law Marie were living with him. Both were working in a box factory. Son Horace, 34, rented an apartment and lived on his own, and his occupation noted as a retail store merchant. Son LeRoy, our grandfather, age 29, lived in Chicago with wife Beatrice and two daughters Gwendolyn and Hortense (our mother). He worked as a "druggist," an old term for pharmacist. Read more about LeRoy's family in the updated pages of the original family history.

Andrew Jackson Trabue passed on Valentine's Day, 14 February 1930 at the age of 75 from a cerebral hemorrhage. He was buried at Crown Hill Cemetery. He left behind an estate valued at \$40,000, which is equivalent to \$618,000 in 2020 dollars. There was no information as to how his estate was apportioned to his heirs.

#### Curran Trabue, Jr. (24/25-J)

I found the following about Curran Sr. and Margaret's tenth child Curran Trabue, Jr., our great-uncle, on his marriage and death records included here. He was born on 1 March 1867-68 in Columbia, Adair County, Kentucky. He, at age 21, married Fannie Boles *Trabue* on 26 November 1889 in Indianapolis.

In the 1900 Census, at age 33, he was a foundry laborer with four of the five children he and Fannie would parent. One child passed away before this census record.

Curran Jr. had continued his employment as a foundry worker as of the 1910 Census.

The 1920 Census found Curran Jr. at age 52 still working at a foundry as a molder and Fannie, age 47, was employed as a maid. His daughters were Susie Trabue

*Andrew* (24/25-J-2) born 1894 and Hazel Trabue (24/25-J-4), born 1897; and granddaughter Marguerite Banner (24/25-J-31), born 1917, all born in Indianapolis.

For the 1930 Census, Curran Jr., age 62, is fortunately still employed at least as of April, the month the census was taken, as this was in the era of the Great Depression. He was still at the foundry as an iron molder. Fannie, age 57, was not employed and granddaughter Marguerite Banner, age 13 was living with them.

In 1931, Fannie Bowles *Trabue* passed at age 58 from uterine cancer. She was buried at New Crown Cemetery in Indianapolis, not to be confused with Crown Hill Cemetery.

Curran Trabue Jr. followed her in death on 21 February 1933 at age 64 from organic heart disease. He was buried at New Crown Cemetery. Records for their adult children are included here.

## Edward Byron Trabue (24/25-K)

Curran Sr. and Margaret's eleventh child, Edward Byron Trabue, our great-uncle, gained the most notoriety of our Trabue ancestors found in this study. He was born in 1872 in Columbia, Adair County, Kentucky. He married Cora C. Hurt *Trabue* in 1897. He fathered three known children, all daughters, between 1897 and 1905 in Indianapolis.

In 1906, Edward and a man named George Sneed were the first two African Americans appointed as patrolmen in the history of the Indianapolis Police Department. The two became known locally and nationally as Sneed and Trabue. The newsprint media was eager to write stories about the arrests of this crime fighting duo that mentored the black neighborhoods of Indianapolis. A few of those stories are included in this study. Their effectiveness as police officers earned them promotions in 1919 to Detective Sergeants, the first blacks appointed to this position in the Department's history. Yet, another historical highlight in our family history.

After 20 years on the force, Detective Sergeant Edward B. Trabue suffered a stroke and passed away on 17 March 1927 at age 55. He was buried at Crown Hill

Cemetery in Indianapolis as are many of our Trabue family members. Wife Cora Hurt *Trabue* lived 30 years after him and died in 1957. She was also buried at Crown Hill Cemetery.

#### Other Trabue Descendants

The other known children of Curran Trabue Sr. and Margaret A. Scott were daughters named Susan (24/25-F) (their sixth), Minervia B. (24/25-G) (seventh), and Margaret L. (24/25-L) (twelfth). Their sons were Beverley B. (24/25-H) (eighth) and Lee P. (24/25-I) (ninth). These descendants require more study.

Newspaper clippings of various Trabue family members and descendants are included at the end of their sections.

### POPE ANCESTORS & FAMILIES

The white Pope families of Louisville, Jefferson County were men of profession, such as attorneys-at-law and politicians, rather than planters. However, they became wealthy largely as real estate landowners. They were considered one of the most distinguished families in Kentucky. And it appears that a branch of that family enslaved our Pope ancestors. The small number of slaves this family held in the 1850 and 1860 Censuses suggests that our ancestors weren't plantation slaves but worked as domestic slaves for the Pope Family estate and staffed their home.

#### Preston William Pope (52)

My present study unearthed the names of an additional generation of direct ancestors, namely Preston William Pope (52), presumed born about 1806, and Nelly Garnett *Pope* (53), born 1804-06. Some records spell the surname as Poppe. They were our great<sup>3</sup>-grandparents and were the parents of our great<sup>2</sup>-grandfather (26) Wilkinson Pope, their second child, born 1833 in Kentucky. The year they "married" is unknown, perhaps about 1825.

Preston and Nelly Garnett were recorded on the death certificate of their first child, son George Pope (52/53-A), born 1826 in Kentucky, as informed by his niece Nancie Pope *Graham* (52/53-B-1) born between 1862-68 in Kentucky. Sarah J. Pope *Leonard* (52/53-C) was their third child, born 1846.

In one record, there is evidence that ancestor Preston Pope was a son of a white Pope slaveholder in Louisville. Therefore, it's plausible that Preston was a white man. However, records suggested that Nelly and his children with her were enslaved.

I found a man named William Pope in the 1850 Census for Free Persons. He was a black man and age 98, which suggested the birth year of 1752. His birthplace

was noted as Virginia. At this writing, I do not know if this person was related to our Pope ancestors.

In the 1850 Census, a Martha Pope, white, age 65, (birth year of 1785; birthplace, Virginia) was listed in Louisville. She valued her real estate at \$2,400 or about \$40,000 in 2020 dollars. She was living with the Humphrey Family. At this writing, it appears that she is an additional generation of our Pope ancestors, our great<sup>4</sup>-grandmother. Future documents that are found will further confirm this ancestor.

In the 1860 Census for Free Persons, Ward 5, listed Martha P. Pope, age 75 (age and birthplace remained consistent with 1850 Census) with a personal estate value noted as \$18,000 or about \$561,000 in 2020 dollars. She was living with a household staff of five domestic workers: one white and the rest free black persons. I saw no surname connections to any of these workers.

I looked at the 1860 Census and a P. Pope, at age 54 in Ward 6 of Louisville, was listed with the J. W. (John Watson) Barr Family. However, this person was enumerated as a white female. It might be that Mr. P. Pope (which I interpreted as Preston Pope) separated from (Mrs.) P. Pope and she kept her husband's name for business transactions. The marital separation because of Preston's relationship with our great³-grandmother Nelly might explain why she was living with the Barr family. J. W. Barr was an attorney and could be related to Mrs. P. Pope. The birth year and place remained consistent with later census records. Mrs. P. Pope valued her real estate at \$75,000 or about \$2.3 million in 2020 dollars. Her personal estate was valued at \$25,000 or about \$780,000 in today's dollars.

The Slave Schedule Census for 1860, Ward 6, listed P. Pope with nine slaves. The noted hash marks, genders, and ages appear to represent an enslaved family group. With the exception of Nelly, the genders and ages of three of the four Pope children I've identified as our ancestors are consistent with the stats for this family group. That means the remaining five or six individuals in this family group may be siblings that I haven't yet identified.

The 1870 Census found Preston William Pope, white, age 64 and confirmed the birth year of 1806 with Virginia his birthplace but enumerated again as female. She was living in Louisville with the Barr Family. Preston was independently wealthy, despite the

recent war, as her noted personal estate had grown from \$25,000 in 1860 to \$90,000, which is equivalent to \$1.8 million in 2020 dollar plu \$2.3 million in real estate she had.

The 1880 Census found Preston Pope, white, in Louisville at age 74 and enumerated this time as male. He was the "head of household" and the Barr Family was living with him.

For genealogy purposes, this study holds with the male gender in the 1880 Census for Preston Pope. All other personal statistics for this man was consistent with the records of our known Pope ancestors. Hopefully, more vital records and directories will be uncovered and allow more study.

Preston William Pope, our great<sup>3</sup>-grandfather, passed away on 7 May 1889 in Indianapolis at about age 83. His burial place is unknown.

## Nelly Garnett Pope (53)

An enslaved Kentuckian by birth, the records suggested that her relationship with slaveholder Preston W. Pope was a long-standing one. In 1826, at the age of 20, she gave birth to George her first known child. Wilkinson came in 1833 and Sarah in 1846.

Great<sup>3</sup>-grandmother Nelly "Nellie" Garnett *Pope* was found in the 1870 Census at age 64 in Indianapolis, Indiana. She lived with her granddaughter Nancy ("Nanna or Nancie") Pope *Graham* and grandson-in-law James Graham. It appears that Nelly and her children left their ex-slaveholder Preston W. Pope and Kentucky shortly after the ratification of the Thirteenth Amendment freed them. Since Nelly was enumerated in 1870 and in 1880 living apart from Preston, it suggested that maybe she and Preston were never truly married; and that their relationship and resultant children were a real-life example of a slaveholder fathering children with a woman he enslaved.

Nelly Garnett Pope, our Pope Matriarch at the time, died on 1 April 1894 in Indianapolis. Her death record said age 90. She was buried at Crown Hill Cemetery.

## Corporal George B. Pope (52/53-A)

George Pope, our great²-uncle, was born on 8 February 1826 in Louisville, Kentucky. His mother and siblings were enslaved. At age 38, he "left" his enslaved family and was mustered in the 107th United States Colored Infantry as a Corporal in Company A on 18 July 1864 at Louisville, Kentucky. His rank and return indicated his valiant performance as a soldier. He returned home to Louisville at year-end 1866.

Corporal George Pope was found in the 1865 Louisville Directory. He is listed as "Pope, George, *col'd*, soldier, r. (residence) ws (west south) 10th between Walnut and Chestnut." Another person was listed as "Pope, Zachariah, *col'd*" and living at the same address. Zachariah could be a brother I haven't yet positively identified or an uncle. More research is needed.

Having migrated north since the Civil War, the 1880 Census enumerated George (described black) at age 53 in Center Township, Marion County, Indiana, where Indianapolis is located. He's alone on the census and employed as a farm laborer by a white farmer.

The discovery of his Indiana marriage certificate gave valuable information about George Pope. At age 60, he married Patience Dunnaway Williams on 10 March 1887. She was age 35. The document recorded his mother's name as Nellie Garner (a variant of Garnett) (53). His father's name was transcribed only as "D". This could be a transcription error. See the newspaper notice of marriage license included.

On 18 June 1888, George applied from Kentucky for his soldier's pension at age 62, which might indicate his inability to work.

On 6 June 1899, Patience Dunnaway Williams *Pope* died at age 47 in Indianapolis. The cause of death is unknown at this writing. George and Patience were married 12 years. She was buried at Crown Hill Cemetery.

The 1900 Census enumerates George as "head of household," age 74, and reflects the recent change in marital status to Widowed. He was retired. Living with him was his niece Nannie Pope *Graham* (52/53-B-1), 38, worked as a laundress, her husband James, 51, employed as a plasterer, and daughter Hazel (52/53-B-1-1), 12, was in school.

The 1910 Census enumerates George at age 83 as "mulatto", a racial term meaning of mixed race. Nannie, age 60 and now widowed, lived with him. She continued employment as a laundress.

Corporal George B. Pope died of Bright's disease (kidney disease) at age 88 on 28 October 1914 in Indianapolis. His death certificate recorded his father, Preston Popp and Nellie Garnett, his mother, as informed by his niece Nancy Pope *Graham* (52/53-B-1). He was buried at Crown Hill Cemetery. George had no known children.

## Wilkinson Pope (26)

Since my 2015 study about our great²-grandfather, Wilkinson Pope, I've found new details that add to and correct the previous narrative about him. The discovery of his death record, included here, revealed his actual birth date: 25 March 1833, as informed by his niece, Nellie Leonard *Martin* (52/53-C-2). She was the daughter of his sister, Sarah J. Pope *Leonard* (52/53-C). Other records suggested that he was born in Louisville, in Jefferson County, Kentucky. Our great²-grandfather Wilkinson was the second child of Preston and Nelly Garnett *Pope*. His mother Nelly Garnett and his siblings were likely enslaved by Preston.

Later in the 1850 Census for Kentucky and then in the 1870 Census for Indiana, Wilkinson's race was described as white, then mulatto and his wife white, as seemed apparent to the census takers at those times. By the 1880 Census, the race of Wilkinson and his family were noted as black.

Wilkinson and Elizabeth Hughes "married as slaves" in 1853, at about ages 20 and 19 according to the 1900 Census, in Kentucky. A newspaper obituary article at the time of his death said they were married after they came to Indiana. The article is included; however, I transcribed a portion of it below:

"When a young man and in slavery, Pope ran away from his master in Kentucky and came to Indianapolis. After working long enough to buy a team (of horses) and a wagon he returned to Kentucky and slipped out again with his sweetheart whom he married here."

The Indianapolis News, Indianapolis, Indiana
09 February 1909, page 16

Another transcribed newspaper obituary said this:

"He came to the city from Jefferson Co., Ky. in 1864. He began farming and accumulated some valuable real estate. He and his wife who survives him were married 53 years."

Indianapolis Recorder, Indianapolis, Marion County, Indiana, 30 January 1909

After I analyzed these two stories and the records, I concluded that our great<sup>2</sup>-grandparents Wilkinson and Elizabeth were ages 20 and 19 when they were allowed to marry. They gave birth to children Susan Ann Pope (52/53-B-2), born 9 October 1854; and Sallie Pope (52/53-B-3), born 1855.

In 1864, Wilkinson and Elizabeth were ages 31 and 30 with 10 and 9-year-old daughters Susan Ann and Sallie. In May of that year, the 107th United States Colored Infantry began organizing in his town of Louisville. Wilkinson saw choices he had to make for himself and his young family: stay a slave, become a Union soldier, or free himself and his family in nearby Indiana. He chose the latter. For the good of his family, he decided to free himself first.

It's reasonable that our great<sup>2</sup>-grandfather's escape to freedom was a physical challenge and an emotional challenge since he had to leave Elizabeth and his daughters behind.

Wilkinson likely depended on the connections the Underground Railroad provided to slaves brave enough to chance the journey. The fortunate thing in his favor was that one of the longest established and expertly conducted routes to freedom was

within five miles of Louisville across the Ohio River to New Albany in southern Indiana, a free state.

How long it took Wilkinson to work and save enough to purchase a "team and a wagon" to return to Kentucky to retrieve his wife and children couldn't be determined. It's conceivable that Wilkinson's first escape might have been a year or two earlier than 1864; then he sneaked back into Kentucky to smuggle his family to Indiana in 1864.

Having freed his family, Wilkinson worked on a farm in the southeast vicinity of Marion County in an area called Beech Grove. He and Elizabeth could read and write which made them an immediate asset to the small black community of ex-slaves who lived there and supported their families by farm labor. Their literacy may indicate that they received progressive treatment from the white Pope family who held them.

When community leaders decided to organize to have a Baptist church, Wilkinson and Elizabeth helped with the task. On 3 November 1867, Lick Creek Baptist Church was established. They were the only founding members who could read and write. In 1875, the Church moved to Indianapolis. That year Wilkinson and Elizabeth, according to their Indiana marriage record, made their slave marriage legal on 2 December 1875. The church, after several more moves, finally settled in 1927 in its present location on Hosbrook Street. The Church was renamed Olivet Baptist Church.

The analysis of various records shines a curious light on the relationships Wilkinson had with two women outside his marriage to Elizabeth. The first woman was Lucy Demar who was named as "mother" on the 1918 death certificate for his daughter with Lucy, Nancy Pope *Graham* (52/53-B-1) born 1844 as her age of 26 suggested in the 1870 Census (though Nancy's death record said her birth year was 1868). The informant on this record was Mrs. E. Pope, which I interpreted as Elizabeth Pope (27). Nancy's birth year of 1844 suggested that Wilkinson and Lucy's very young teenage relationship was before his relationship with Elizabeth. For our history, I assume that Lucy was Wilkinson's first partner. His first child, Nancy, was ten years older than his daughter Susan Ann with Elizabeth. It's not inconceivable that Lucy died sometime after the birth of her daughter, Nancy, and thus gave Wilkinson the opportunity for a new partnership with Elizabeth. If all this was plausible, then in 1864 Wilkinson and Elizabeth crossed over to Indiana freedom with three daughters.

The second woman was Mary Gilbert, age 23, who in 1876 sued Wilkinson, age 43, for paternity of her daughter Anna Pope (52/53-B-4), born in 1875 in Indianapolis; and to whom she gave his surname despite losing the suit against Wilkinson in court.

By 1880, within sixteen years of freedom, Wilkinson had saved enough to purchase his own farm. In 1887, he witnessed the marriage of daughter Susan Ann Pope *Howard* (52/53-B-2) to our great-grandfather, Andrew Jackson Trabue (24/25-C).

Throughout his life, Wilkinson was smart as well as shrewd. He purchased large tracts of farmland real estate in Marion County and then he sold it to others in lots. Public notices and newspapers recorded many of his lot transactions. His success was such that his accumulations became substantial. The discovery of his wealthy landowner father, Preston W. Pope, explains how Wilkinson gained his financial sense.

At his death on 22 January 1909 from uremia, a kidney disorder, his personal estate was valued at more than \$5,000, equivalent to about \$142,000 in 2020 dollars. The value of his real estate holdings is unknown. Wilkinson Pope was age 75. He and Elizabeth were married for 57 years. He was buried at Crown Hill Cemetery.

His death record and Last Will & Testament document is included. Elizabeth inherited his full estate.

## Susan Ann Pope Howard; Trabue (52/53-B-2)

Susan Ann Pope (13) was our great-grandmother. Her parents' first child, she was born in Louisville in Jefferson County, Kentucky on 9 October 1854. Her family was enslaved.

In 1864, her father, Wilkerson Pope (26) smuggled her, her sister Sallie, her halfsister Nancy, and her mother Elizabeth out of slavery in Kentucky to freedom in Indiana, likely via the Underground Railroad. Her family settled in Marion County in the area now called Beech Grove, southeast of the city of Indianapolis.

Susan Ann grew up and at age 18, she married John B. Howard, age 22, in 1872. She and John had three children: Elizabeth "Bessie" Howard (52/53-13-1), born 1874; John W. Howard (52/53-13-2), born 1879; and Caswell Allen Howard (52/53-13-3),

born 1886. Unfortunately, their son John W. died at age 5 in 1884. The cause of death is unknown. Then her husband John B passed away in 1886 at age 36, the same year baby Caswell entered the world. The cause is not known. Both were buried at Crown Hill Cemetery.

She next married our great-grandfather, Andrew Jackson Trabue, age 32, on 20 October 1887. He lived on an adjacent farm. Susan and Jackson had four sons: LeRoy Trabue (24/25-C-12/13-1), our grandfather, born 1890; Oliver Horace Trabue (24/25-C-12/13-2), born 1894; Otto Jackson Trabue (24/25-C-12/13-3), born 1896; and Russell Pope Trabue (24/25-C-12/13-4), born 1900.

Susan Ann Pope *Howard Trabue* fell ill with cerebral meningitis and at age 52 she passed away on 26 March 1907 in Indianapolis. She was buried at Crown Hill Cemetery.

#### Nancy "Nannie" Pope *Graham* (52/53-B-1)

From the previous ancestor histories, you've already learned a lot about who Nancy Pope Graham was and what she meant to her family. She was Wilkinson Pope's daughter born 1844 with first partner Lucy Demar. She had husband James and daughter Hazel. She was also the caretaker for her grandmother, Nelly Garnett Pope and for her Civil War veteran uncle, George B. Pope.

Nancy Pope *Graham* passed away on 3 March 1918 between the ages of 50 and 56 in Indianapolis. The cause of death was mitral stenosis and pulmonary edema likely due to the Spanish flu pandemic, which was at its height that year. She was buried at Crown Hill Cemetery.

### Elizabeth Hughes *Pope* (27)

Further research corrected our great<sup>2</sup>-grandmother's maiden name from Lewis to Hughes. Previous erroneous information is removed on her updated Ancestor Page and

other affected pages of our genealogy. On the 1907 death record of her daughter Susan Ann Trabue *Howard* (52/53-B-1), Elizabeth Pope (27) informed the space for "maiden name of mother" as Elizabeth Hughes, herself.

From the above life stories of our ancestors, much can be surmised about who Elizabeth Hughes was. Elizabeth was born a slave in May of 1834 in Kentucky.

In the 1870 Census, her race was described as white. To the census taker she obviously appeared to be white. Later censuses described her as black, which leads to questions about the racial identity of her mother and father.

Her slave marriage to Wilkinson Pope was a real contract between them despite it not being recognized as legitimate by white Kentucky society. In the early 1860s, when Wilkinson left her and his young daughters to seek freedom in Indiana, Elizabeth must have worried that he'd be caught and severely punished; or that he'd be killed never to be seen again.

When Wilkinson finally returned to Kentucky to fetch Elizabeth in 1864, one can imagine her fear of traveling the Underground Railroad with three children in tow. And one can imagine her joy upon standing on the land of freedom, which was Indiana.

I'd like to think that her daughter Susan Ann's marriage to John B. Howard in 1872 was a joyous occasion in the Pope household. And that she enjoyed her grandchildren that came after.

The eleven years since their arrival in Indiana must have seemed to fly by. The family farm was productive and Wilkinson was doing well with his real estate investments; and still she and Wilkinson hadn't made their "slave marriage" legal in the eyes of the State of Indiana. They finally got around to it and "officially" married on 2 December 1875. In 1876, who knows what frustrations she held as she coped during Mary Gilbert's paternity suit against her husband? This couldn't have been a happy period in her life. The court ruled against Mary Gilbert, but her daughter Anna Pope carried his surname.

It appears that Elizabeth had a normal relationship with Wilkinson's daughter Nancy Pope *Graham* (52/53-B-1) from his previous relationship with Lucy Demar, as Elizabeth was the informant on Nancy's 1918 death certificate.

Death in youth is always a tragedy and Elizabeth wasn't spared. Her 5-year-old grandson John W. died in 1884 and two years later her son-in-law John B. Howard died. Perhaps she was a comfort to her daughter Susan Ann through her season of grief. And perhaps she welcomed Andrew Jackson Trabue, our great-grandfather, when he entered Susan Ann's life and married her in 1887. Perhaps Elizabeth felt renewed joy as four more grandsons arrived making the Pope household a lively place to be.

However, sorrow wouldn't become a stranger to Elizabeth. She lived beyond the deaths of Wilkinson's parents Preston (d.1889) and Nelly (d. 1894); her daughter Susan Ann (d. 1907) and then husband Wilkinson (d. 1909).


Elizabeth lived a long life as a widow, well taken care of by Wilkinson's personal and real estate legacy. Newspaper clippings tell of her community connections with friends, social and political clubs.

Elizabeth Hughes Pope succumbed to a pulmonary hemorrhage and passed away on 1 November 1926. She was age 92. She was buried at Crown Hill Cemetery. How her personal estate and real estate holdings were distributed amongst her heirs remains unknown.

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
#### TRABUE ANCESTOR PEDIGREE

Curran Sr & Margaret A Trabue's 12 children in purple







#### RUN OVER BY AN ENGINE.

Woman Falls to Track from Wagon and is Instantly Killed.

Mrs. Josie Trabue, colored, fifty years old, living in Perkins pike, Norwood, was instantly killed by a Big Four freight engine, No. 719, at the Belt crossing in Norwood, this forenoon.

Accompanied by Laura Miller and Ida Trabue, her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Trabue started to drive to the city to see the circus parade. Mrs. Trabue sat in a chair in the back part of the wagon. As the wagon was crossing the track, the engine approached, backing northeast toward a switch which enters the yards. There was apparently no danger, but Mrs. Trabue's chair tilted backward and she fell over the endgate on to the tracks. Before she could regain her feet the engine passed over her body, mangling it in a terrible manner and causing instant death.

The engine was in charge of Frank Murphy, engineer, and was on the way to the yard to take out a Cincinnati freight train, known as "second 90."

A telephone call was sent to the City Dispensary to have the ambulance go to East street and the tracks. It was said that the body would be sent there on an engine. After waiting about an hour the ambulance proceeded to Norwood, and the pieces of the body were gathered up along the tracks. This duty the train men refused to do.

Mrs. Trabue leaves a husband, Peter Trabue, and seven children.

#### Killed on a Crossing

Mrs. Josie Trabue, a colored woman living on the Perkins' pike, near the city, was caught under the wheels of Big Four engine, No. 719, Tuesday at the Prospect-st. crossing of the Belt tracks and killed, her body being so mutilated and ground to pieces that the remains were gathered together in a sheet of canyas.

Mrs. Trabue, accompanied by Mrs. Ida Trabue and Miss Laura Miller, was driving to the city in a light wagon. The vehicle was driven across the tracks and the jurring of the wagon threw Mrs. from the chair in which she was sitting. She fell to the tracks and the engine, which was rapidly approaching passed over her. The deceased was fifty years of age and is mother of seven children.

Detective Sergeant Edward Byron Trabue was born in Kentucky, 1871. He died February 17, 1927. He served with the Indianapolis Police Department from July 18, 1906 to February 17, 1927. \*On May 28, 1919, he was promoted from Patrolman to Detective Sergeant . This was the first time an African-American was promoted to the rank of Sergeant. Two other African-Americans were promoted to Sergeant this same date. His obituary described him as a currently serving Detective Sergeant with the Indianapolis Police Department. The Chief's office described him as one of the best men in the department. He and his "running mate" Detective Sneed "did commendable work in solving many mysteries for the department." Mayor Lewis Shank at one time called Trabue and Sneed "the best detectives in the department." He was a Mason and a Shriner.

# 11 POLICEMEN ARE PROMOTED

Henry Sandmann Reduced From Lieutenant to Sergeant by Safety Board.

#### ONE TRANSFER ANNOUNCED

Five Advancements Made in Detective Department—John J. Kelly, Discharged Soldier, Reinstated.

Eleven promotions, one transfer and one reduction in the police department were made yesterday by the board of public safety on the recommendation of Chief of Police Coffin. Licut. Henry Sandmahn was reduced to a sergeant and Sergt. R. E. Woollen was promoted to his place. Sandmann joined the force on Dec. 15, 1899 and became a lieutenant in 1906. Five promotions were made to the detective department as follows: William Reilly from bicycleman to detective sergeant: Patrick Roache from bicycleman to detective sergeant: George Speed from patrolman to detective sergeant; Edward Trabue from patrolman to detective sergeant; Fdward Trabue from patrolman to detective sergeant and Harry Bridwell from patrolman to detective sergeant. Serst. Othello Thomas, who has charge of an emergency squad, was transferred to the detective department

with the same rank.

#### First Colored Sergeants,

Sneed and Trabue are both colored, and it is said to be the first time in the history of the department that two colored men have been given the rank of sergeant in the detective department. Both men have made excellent records.

Reilly was captain of detectives when James Quigley was chief of police and Roaghe was a detective.

Patrolman Edward C. Rall was promoted to sergeant of police. He has recently been discharged from the army, where he held the rank of Heutenant. He will fill the vacancy caused by Sergi. Thomas's transfer.

Patrolmen Charles Gollnisch and John W. Wiles were raised to bicyclemen to fill the vacancies caused by the promotions of Reilly and Reache.


Patrolman Thomas Bledsoe was promoted to the humano department, and

Patrolman Joshua Spearis, colored, was advanced to the same department. Both will rank as sergeants. Spearis has been probation officer in the Juvenile Court.

sworn out by Phoebe Davis, a white woman living at 2112 West Morris street. The charge is the result of a real estate deal. Bullup was released on bond. His attorney declared Bullup was the victim of unfortunate circumstances, his partner having disappeared with their joint funds.

Bullup is a real estate dealer with ofdees at 1349 North Senate avenue. He was active in church work and won the confidence of many leading colored people and some white people, the police say. He was arrested on charges of issuing frandulent checks and embezzle ment Nov. 27, 1920, and on Dec. 7 was bound over to the grand jury by Special Judge Abrams.

The arrest at that time was made by the same detectives. Eighteen persons told the police they had been swindled by Bullup. More than that number have appeared before the grand jury, it is said.

A receiver has been appointed for Bullup's affairs.

## SAYS BUCKNER MADE BOAST OF 'GETTING' MAN

Co-Defendant Scores for State in Negro's Trial for Napariu Murder.

#### DENIES 'FRAMING' CASE

By Staff Correspondent.

SHELBYVILLE, Ind., Jan. 27.—Lawrence Allen, one of the six Indianapolis negroes indicted for the murder of Adam Napariu, deputy health inspector of Indianapolis, in testifying today for the State in the trial of William Buckner, negro, also charged with the Napariu murder, aserted that Buckner informed his crowd that he had "got one of the hunkles" in the fight on the West Tenth street road on the night of Aug. 14, when Napariu was killed.

Examination of Allen took up practically the entire morning of the second day of the trial in the Shelby Circuit Court. The State expected to rest its evidence during the afternoon.

Allen and Henry Lee are two of the defendants brought here to testify for the State. Allen denied on the witness stand, during a severe cross-examination by Attorney Cheney for the defense, that he and the other defendants had agreed to place the blame for Napariu's death on Buckner or that they had concocted a story about Buckner admitting having "got one of the hunkles" or "flashing" his pistol before the fray.

On direct examination Allen stated he met Buckner about 5 o'clock on the afternoon of the hold-up. He testified that he next went to a shining parlor and later to a second-hand store, where he bought a pistol and warridges. The contridges

a pistol and cartridges. The cartridges he gave to one of the defendants called "Beefhead Montgomery."

#### DESCRIBES START OF NEGRO PARTY.

About 8 o'clock he met Harold Kaufman, who had arranged the party, and he saw Buckner standing by the car, which had been brought to the place by Henry Lee. When the crowd entered the car, Allen said, they agreed to obtain pistols, and those who did not have any would be supplied. Allen testified Kaufman carried a piece of iron and that Buckner told Allen his pistol was not large enough and then gave him another. Five of the seven in the auto had guns when the party started. When they arrived on the West Tenth street road the bootleggers' cars, with Napariu, did not

errive for some time and Allen said John Montgomery, one of the negroes, suggested going back to Indianapolis.

Then, according to Allen, Buckner said he would stay and if necessary get the liquor himself, as he needed the money. With this Buckner flashed his gun, Allen testified. Kaufman and Buckner helped the "hunkles" push their car, which had gone dead, to the negroes' car and started transferring the liquor.

Allen said he heard a blow as if some one was struck over the head. A fight ensued and Allen was shot twice in the leg. He was put into the car by Henry Lee. When Montgomery asked if any one was shot, Mike McGuire said Allen was shot twice and then, according to Allen, Buckner waved his gun and said: "Don't worry. I got one of the hunkles."

SAW BUCKNER ATTACK MAN.

Allen said be saw Buckner in the act of hitting one of the "hunkies" over the head while the foreigner was being held by Henry Lee. He said he also saw Buckner shooting and that he did not see any of the other colored men shooting.

Allen attributed the fight to the fact that the "hunkies" were not supposed to deal with any but white men and became enraged when they saw the negroes in the crowd brought to the place by Kaufman.

On cross-examination, Allen stated he saw two flashes from the pistol of Buckner, but did not see the white man who had been shet in the stomach.

Allen denied that he had been visited at the hospital, where he was held for five days, by any persons who were interested in the case or by this colored friends. He said the a statement to the Indianal blice the day he was returned from hospital, without having seen any of his associates on the night of the murder.

Disclosures of a system of distribution of "white mule" through the activity of Napariu and revelations concerning a plot to steal large quantities of contraband corn whisky were made during the course of the trial.

Evidence introduced by the State shows

band corn whisky were made during the course of the trial.

Evidence introduced by the State shows that John Sarban, Steve Frazee and his son, John Frazee, manufactured large quantities of "white mule" at the Frazee "farm" and that Napariu aided in obtaining the corn for the "mule," in addition to acting as the "agent" in the distribution of the corn whisky.

John Frazee, through an interpreter, testified that he and his father, Steve, with John Sarban and Napariu, went in an automobile on the night of Aug. 14, 1920, to deliver twenty gallons of "white mule" to Harold Kauffman, near the first bridge on the West Tenth street road. According to the witness, the delivery was made as the result of arrangements between Napariu and Kauffman.

ADMITS PART IN WHITE MULE GANG.

Frazee admitted that he aided in the manufacture of "white mule" and that Naparlu acted in the capacity of agent in its distribution.

John Frazee testified that they drove to the appointed place on the West Tenth street road and parked their car some distance from where Kaufman stood.

He said that during the transfer of the whisky from the bootleggers' automobile to the car of Henry Lee, a negro, and a brother of the notorious Harry Lee, known as Goosie Lee, a gang of negroes, armed with revolvers and clubs, appeared from a clump of bushes and demanded that Naparlu and his crowd' put up their hands.

Frazee testified that during a fight Napariu was shot through the head and Frazee was shot in the stomach.

John Sarban, alleged by the State to be a member of the Naparin "white mule" gang, gave similar testimony regarding the whisky making activities of the gang and corroborated Frazee's version of the attack by the negroes.

None of the witnesses of the tragedy was able to testify definitely that Buckner fired the fatal shot, but the evidence was that the shot came from the direction where Buckner was supposed to be.

DARKNESS OF NIGHT HANDICAPS STATE.

Because the night of the tragedy was a dark one the State is handicapped in obtaining a witness who actually saw the shooting.

- Stave Frazee, father of John, testified he was knocked down by some one after negroes' attack. He declared he fell unconscious and, on recovering, heard shots and then was again struck on the head.

Richard Voight, a gardener living near the scene of the tragedy, testified he heard the shots. He asserted one shot, which apparently terminated the battle, was of greater volume than the other shots which were fired. The heavier report, the state contends, came from Buckner's 45-caliber revolver.

Detectives George Sneed and Edward Trabue, negro detectives of the Indianapolis police force, testified to finding a 45-caliber revolver at Buckner's home and that Buckner admitted he had the revolver and blackjack with him on the night of the tragedy. Buckner was returned to Indianapolis from Danville, Ill.

Both detectives testified concerning a statement made by Buckner following his arrest, in which he admitted firing a shot after he claimed he was assaulted. The statement shows that Buckner did not know if he "hit" any one.

Buckner was indicted with John Montgomery, Mike McGuire, Henry Lee, Lawrence allen, Edgar Harrison and Harrold Kauffman on charges of first degree murder. The State intends to call several of the indicted men as material witnesses.

Prosecutor William P. Evans of Indianapolis is in charge of the State's case. Buckner is represented by J. C. Cheney and George R. Tolen of Shelbyville.

Mr. Cheney contends that the defense will be that there is a "frame-up" on the part of some members of the whisky stealing gang to put all the blame for the tragedy on Buckner. Cheney takes the position that Buckner is being made the "goat."

Buckner claims the part of his supposed statement in which it is stated that members of the whisky-stealing gang hid in the bushes near the road, was not made by him.

Detective Sneed testified and maintained that Buckner's statement as read before the jury was just as Buckner dictated it to him in the presence of Detective Trabue.

The courtroom is packed to the dodrs and many have been unable to get into the room. Judge Alonzo Blair is presiding and is conducting the case rapidly, permitting nowdelay or unnecessary arguments on motions.

DEATH OF A NEGRO MAN FROM A STAB-THE FIRST COLORED CORONER'S JURY IN KEN-TUCKY.

From the Courier-Journal, June 20.

The rst exclusively negro coroner's jury ever impanelled in this State served in an inquest held at 7 o'clock yesterday afternoon, by S uire D. Lincoln, at the United Sta es Marine Hospital, over the body of John Wagner, the negro who was cut in the abdomen by a negro deckhand on the steamer Robert Burns, on the 29th day of May last. Wagner was taken to the above named institution, where he lingered until yesterday at noon, when he died from the effect of his wounds. About 8 o'clock yesterday mording the dying man made the following statements in answer to interrogatori s made by an officer and two attendants of the hospital.

Question-What is your name and age? Auswer-John Wagner; twenty-one years of

Q -Have you any earthly hopes of living or recovering from your present wounds?

A.-No.

Q -Do you think there is any possible chance for you to get well?

A -No.

Q .- Have you given up all hope of ever getting well again? Have you made up your mind that you must die?

A. -All hopes are gone.

Q -Who wounded you, who hurt you, and

where did it occur?

A .- A young colored man by the name of Reynolds; I do not know whether James or William He was quarreling with another colored hand on the boat as we were coming up the river, thirty or forty miles below here. endeavored to stop the quarrel

A.-While Reynolds and as other colored man were quarreling, I interfered to st p the quar-reling, when Reynolds and myself got to figuting, when he drew a penknife, or rather a small knife, and cut me across the abdomen, inflicting a fatal would, from which I am about to die. 

**REV. ROBERT D. LEONARD** Baptist folks, both pastors and laymen, crowded Mt. Zion Baptist Church last Monday to pay final tribute to Rev. Robert Darius Leonard, for 50 years a stalwart in the Baptist faith and a courageous community leader.

Rev. R. T. Andrews, the church pastor, eloquently reviewed the long ministerial career of the highly esteemed preacher. Rev. Leonard died on Thanksgiving Day at the home of his grandchildren, Robert Wilson and (Continued on Page 2)

Lee Ann Wilson, 4066 Rookwood Avenue, following a long illness. He was 90 years old. A resident here for 85 years, he served for many years as president of the Indiana Association of Negro Baptists. Born in Jefferson County, Kentucky in 1859, he moved to Albany, Ind., in 1864 at the close of the Civil War and shortly thereafter came to Indianapolis.

A strong, strapping youngster, he worked on a farm located in the southeastern section of the city. Later, he became the first pupil to enter one of the free schools which were being established at that time.

Possessed with the then-rare accomplishment of being able to read and write, he was employed by the Mooney-Ward Drug Company during which time he became interested in the ministry.

He remained in the employ of the prominent drug firm for many years during all of which time he was earnestly preparing himself for the calling which he graced so successfully and impressively throughout later years.

Ordained a minister in August 1892, he accepted his first charge at Edinburg, Ind., following which he pastored throughout the southern part of the state and in Ohio and Kentucky.

Returning here he became pastor of the Union Tabernacle Baptist church for the second time. It was later merged with Shiloh Baptist Church under Rev. Judge I. Saunders.

After a few years Rev. Leonard accepted the associate pastorate of Mt. Zion Baptist church under Rev. K. T. Andrews and maintained his membership there until his death.

Recipient of many honors as tribute to his outstanding ability and character, he received an honorary degree of doctor of divinity conferred by Simmons University, and was awarded the medal of honor with money award from the Lavinia Dixon Lewis Memorial Foundation for the year 1944.

This honor is usually restricted to women of unusual ability and talent.

Married to Miss Lee Ann Alexander of Louisville, Ky., in 1884, the celebrated their golden anniversary in September, 1934, in a public ceremony attended by hundreds of friends and fellow pastors.


Mrs. Leonard died several years later.

Survivors are the granddaughter, Miss Wilson, and grandson, Mr. Wilson. Burial was in Crown Hill Cemetery.

# **History of Olivet Baptist Church**

Indianapolis Recorder, Indianapolis, Marion County, 29 April 1933, page 3



The Olivet Baptist Church was organized in 1866, having its beginning in the country southeast of this city (what is now called Beech Grove). The Olivet Church was first called the Lick Creek Baptist Church, with its charter members, namely: Brother Cassell Howard and wife, Cain Leonard, John Lewis, Jessie McCrooklin, George Pope and wife, and Prince Adams. Rev. W. M. Singleton was the first pastor.

Later, in 1875, the church moved into the city in a temporary quarter in South East Street, which was then a schoolhouse. Years passed with the changing of the Lick Creek to Olivet Baptist, and the location to Coburn Street, now Prospect Street, near the Fountain

Square.

The various pastors who labored incessantly with this church and faithful members were: Rev. Anderson Simmons, Rev. P. A. Preston, Rev. R. D. Leonard, now pastor of the Union Tabernacle Baptist; Rev. B. R. Reed, Rev. K. Warren, Rev. C. W. Lewis, who remained pastor until the purchase and present site, now located at corner of Grove and Hosbrook Streets. Under the direction of one of the local ministers, Rev. Alexander Brown, this beautiful edifice was built recently.

With over half a century of faithful service in the southeast part of the city, the Olivet Church now numbers over 400, and is now pastored by the Rev. G. L. Lillard, 1217 South Illinois Street.

Indianapolis Journal, Volume 2, Number 75, 12 December 1872 First marriage of (13) Susan Pope Howard Trabue

# —A marriage license was this morning granted John B. Howard and Susan Pope.

Indianapolis News, Indianapolis, Marion County, 22 June 1875, page 2

During the storm last evening the lightning struck a small residence on Martindale avenue, knocking down the chimney and. stunning a colored woman, **Susan Howard** 'She recovered.

## The Indianapolis News 18 May 1876

It is a field-day time for the colored people, for in the civil circuit court the bastardy complaint of Mary Gilbert against Wilkinson Pope is now on trial by jury. The termination of this case will complete the docket in this line of business and give the judge more time for calm reflection.

(My note: A bastardy complaint is an old term for a paternity suit.)

The bastardy complaint of Mary Gilbert vs. Wilkinson Pope has gone to the jury.

The Indianapolis News May 20 1876

The Mary Gilbert vs. Wilkinson Pope bastardy suit has ended in favor of defendant. (My note: Despite the verdict, Mary Gilbert named her child, a daughter, Anna Pope and they are found in the 1880 Census.)

(My Note: A. T. is likely Wilkinson's son-in-law)




## About the Author


central Illinois and Indiana. With her husband away on business during the week, she delved into

Beneath Every Troublin' Stone (2009, in Digital Format, now in Paperback, 2019), is a historical fiction e-book inspired by the colorful life of a female ancestor Ms. Harris discovered while researching her family roots. The novel is set in early 1900s Syracuse, New York at a time when American society limited civil and career opportunities for black Americans. Yet Bernice Tulley, the novel's heroine, is determined to triumph despite the troublestones that segregated American society hands her and those she brings upon herself.

Bernice Silverson Tulley comes of age in 1904 segregated United States. Her story unravels why an affable, intelligent, well-spoken Georgia girl; well-read yet wide-eyed in youth; a daughter of slave-born parents; and rooted in the Word came to depend upon herself. A prejudiced society works against Bernice and studs her life-journey with troublestones. Troublestones are the world's delusions that tempt, discourage and cause hurt and remorse. She compromises her faith to get what she wants and feels she deserves.

After burying two young husbands, childless, hindered by Jim Crow society, Bernice Tulley thinks bootleg liquor and a high-class brothel are the solutions to the Economic Depression, but her "troublin' stones" just get heavier.

Always a Blessing in the End: The Chronicles of the Four Ancestral Lineages of Ben Ivy & Ruth Thompson (2005, Paperback and Digital Format), a nonfiction ancestral biography, based on fourteen years of research of her ancestry. Those who enjoy reading American history will learn about the struggles of a family of African Americans back to 1790. Beginners and seasoned family history sleuths will be able to glean its noted sources to help them with ancestry searches of their own.

Ruma, Warrior Princess (2012, Digital Format), her first children's e-book, is a story about a real puppy that a mother and daughter receives as a gift while mourning the beloved dog they lost.

Is This All I Truly Am? (2013, Digital Format), Ms. Harris wrote and illustrated her second e-book for children about Deer One, an orphaned fawn fostered by a dog family. Deer One grows up and seeks to learn who and what she really is and her place in the animal world.
